Pierce School Renovations Begin

December 7 may be a day that will live in infamy, but NLPNA will also remember it as the day the closed Pierce School (14th & Maryland Avenues) was sold to Evolve LLC for \$270,000. Evolve plans to renovate the school into seven loft-style rental apartments. Because Evolve had a preoccupancy permit, they were able to do some repairs to the building, such as replacing the roof, prior to December 7. According to Chris Swanson, one of the partners in Evolve, they plan to be historically accurate when they restore the outside of the building.

If work proceeds as planned, Evolve expects to be leasing apartments in September 2001. If you'd like to check out what the building currently looks like, and keep up with the renovations, visit www.evolvellc.com.

Community Initiatives Public Art Program

A speaker from the D.C. Commission on the Arts and Humanities will attend the January NLPNA meeting to discuss the Community Initiatives Public Art Program. The commission is seeking site nominations from District residents for outdoor sites in their communities that are available for long-term placement of public art projects. Each site will be paired with a professional artist who will create an artistic work (mural, sculpture, etc.) specifically for that site. A panel of area arts professionals will review the nominations and select appropriate locations. Community members, along with Arts Commission staff, will then facilitate the process of matching artists with the sites. Preference is given to artists who reside or have studios in the District.

Neighborhood Action on H Street

Did you know that at one time, H Street Northeast was the second busiest commercial area in D.C.? Some of our neighbors remember a time when H Street was a thriving business area where folks bought their clothing, everything for their home and went to the movies. No one had to go to Georgetown or the suburbs to find the latest fashions or buy a kitchen stove. This could happen again! In response to community demands for actions to revitalize H Street, the city has began working on the problem by improving city services and

approaching the development of a strategic plan.

One of the first steps will be an effort by the Ward 6 Neighborhood Services Coordinator, Leo Pinson, with the help of his power team made up of representatives from as many as nine city agencies, to create immediate visible improvements to H Street. Improvements will include street cleaning, building code enforcement, beautification, and education. Ward 6 City Planner Karina Ricks, from the Office of Planning, is coordinating efforts to bring together a broad

cross section of people and interests to craft a single plan for H Street. We are invited to join folks from other neighborhoods in this area such as Stanton Park, Near Northeast, Trinidad and Kingman Park to develop a strategic plan to revitalize H Street. The actual plan will be created through a series of public meetings in the next year. The first meeting will be Saturday, January 27th, from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. The location is to be confirmed but is expected to be Gallaudet University.
