Free Spring Bulbs

The Capitol Hill Garden Club will, once again, give free springflowering bulbs for planting in public spaces on Capitol Hill. Daffodil and crocus bulbs will be given out in October for street tree boxes, pocket parks, school grounds, libraries, and community centers. Applications are due by August 15 and must include a simple planting plan and the name and contact information of the person(s) responsible for the planting. ... Please Water Trees

The NLPNA area received several new trees last fall, through the efforts of both Trees for Capitol Hill and the District's Urban Forestry Administration. However, the trees will need supplemental water for at least their first two summers if they are to survive. A quick blast from a hose encourages poor root development. It's much better to let the water trickle for 20 to 30 minutes. Tree gators (those green watering bags) or buckets with a small hole work well for this purpose.

A passing shower does not provide adequate water; trees need 25 gallons per week. By the time a tree looks like it needs water (is shriveled or drops leaves), it has already been damaged. Don't wait. Be pro-active!

Dogs in Summer

Unfortunately, heat exhaustion is common in dogs in hot weather. Early signs include rapid breathing, heavy panting, and salivation. Other signs are fatigue, muscle tremors, and staggering. If you see a dog with these symptoms, take the dog to a cool, shady place, and apply wet towels or cloths to help cool the dog's body down. Try to give the dog small amounts of water, and immediately call a vet.

To avoid this situation, it's best to walk your dogs very early in the morning or after sundown and don't leave them in a parked car, even with the windows down.
