NLPNA sponsors the Urban Camp Out to bring a wilderness camping experience to children in the city. The Urban Camp Out made learning a lot of fun. During the scavenger hunt, many children learned you really can find a seed on the Kingsman Field. Bureau of Land Management employees taught the children how to put up a tent, and how trash that gets put in the sewers ends up in the Chesapeake Bay. Ranger Kate Bucco of the Kenilworth Aquatic Gardens demonstrated the many ways our rivers can get polluted, and let children look at organisms under a microscope. Before falling asleep.

many children got their first look at the Big Dipper and saw the planet Venus through a powerful telescope. The highly successful bike repair clinic was back for a second year, and volunteers helped repair flat tires and raise seats for those children who grew a foot over the winter. There were basketball and kickball games, tug-of-war, crafts, sidewalk chalk games, and three-leg races. Hands All Around, a musical group led by Bob Fagan, returned for a second year, and got the campers barking to "Let's All Talk Dog Blues." All eyes turned to the D.C. Metropolitan Police's K-9 unit when they did a spell-binding demonstration with three dogs. When the officers took the dogs off their leashes, the crowd was relieved to find the dogs really did obey the officers.


