The Capitol Hill Restoration Society Presents...

"Do We Need the Height Act?", a free forum Wednesday, June 19, 7-9 p.m. at HillCenter 921 Pennsylvania Ave SE. The doors will open at 6:30 pm; the presentation will follow a brief business meeting of the CHRS membership. The speaker will be Laura Richards, an attorney who testified before Congressman Issa's Committee last summer in support of the Height Act. Her testimony emphasized that the Height Act of 1910 plays a positive, powerful role in shaping the cityscape and the experience of living in the District.

The event is free and handicapped accessible, and the public is encouraged to attend. No reservations required. For more information, visit www.chrs.org.

On April 11, the National Capital Planning Commission (NCPC) and the DC Office of Planning announced a study of the impacts of changes to the federal Height of Buildings Act of 1910. The study follows Congressman Darrel Issa's 2012 hearing on "Changes to the Height Act: Shaping Washington, DC for the Future.". NCPC will conduct outreach sessions on May 13 at Petworth Library and May 22 at NCPC's offices. Hearings will be held in June and a draft recommendation will be made in September 2013. Please Water Trees

We are fortunate to have received many new street trees this year, but they will need supplemental water for at least their first two to three summers if they are to survive, and the District government does not water street trees. They rely on the neighbors. You can help by joining the Urban Forestry Administration's Canopy Keeper program and adopting a tree near your home. For those concerned about the cost, this is much less expensive than you may think. Trees for Capitol Hill (TFCH) estimates that it costs less than \$10 to water a tree for an entire summer.

A quick blast from a hose encourages poor root development. It's much better to let the water trickle for 20 to 30 minutes - or better still, use a watering bag or basin. It helps to measure the amount of water you are delivering, and a garden hose connected to a nearby water source makes the job easy. The trees will need an absolute minimum of 10 gallons each week – but as much as 20-30 gallons may be needed in very hot, dry weather. Mulch is also important. A 2-4 inch layer is sufficient, but the mulch must be kept away from the trunk to discourage destructive insects. Clean weeds from the planting space. This helps in two ways: First, the tree will not have to compete with the weeds for water. Second, the water bags are less likely to be punctured by mowers if there is nothing to mow.

By the time a tree looks like it needs water (is shriveled or drops leaves), it has already been damaged. Don't wait. Be proactive!

TFCH has a few bags and basins that can be borrowed for the season. If you want one, contact The Buzz.
