On Wednesday, October 8, 2003, Lincoln Park will be an official meeting place for the Capitol Hill Cluster School's (CHCS) Walk to School Day. Walk to School Day gives children, parents, school teachers, and community leaders an opportunity to celebrate the many benefits of walking. Last year nearly 3 million walkers from 28 countries walked to school – all hoping to create communities that are safe places to walk.

CHCS students, parents, and faculty, as well as Capitol Hill neighbors & VIPs, will meet at Lincoln Park beginning at 7:30 a.m. At 8:15 they will begin the walk to school, arriving in time for the morning bell at Peabody E.S., Watkins E.S., & Stuart Hobson M.S. Police officers (Metropolitan Police and Park Police) will help participants walk safely to school by stopping traffic at busy intersections.

(October NLPNA Meeting)

The District of Columbia Transit
Alternatives Analysis is a joint 18month community-based
transportation study by the DC
Department of Transportation
(DDOT) and the Washington
Metropolitan Area Transit
Authority (WMATA) to examine
new transit alternatives, like light
rail and bus rapid transit, along
corridors identified in the District's
1997 Transportation Vision Plan.

Following a recently completed feasibility study, the District and WMATA are working together to develop plans for these four high priority corridors:

- Anacostia Corridor/Minnesota Ave. to National Harbor
- Silver Spring to Anacostia Corridor
- Woodley Park to Stadium-Armory
- Georgetown to Stadium-Armory

Now, through the Transit Alternatives Analysis, the public is invited to provide input about transit technologies, route alignment, station areas, and more.

Representatives of WMATA and DDOT will attend the October NLPNA meeting to provide further information and solicit feedback. They will also discuss the Anacostia Demonstration Project, which will test the application of light rail technology.

Lincoln Park Discussed at Sept. NLPNA Meeting

Superintendent John Hale, National Capitol Parks East, and Chief Pettiford and Lt. Horton, Capitol Park Police, attended the meeting with members of their staffs and took comments from neighbors regarding several issues, most notably the hours of operation for the park and lighting.

Superintendent Hale made a commitment to change the hours at the park so that it will be closed only from midnight until 5 a.m. and to keep the floodlights on all night, effective October 1. Beginning September 15, an assessment of tree condition will be made; dead and/or unsafe trees will be removed and replaced with new trees. Also, two repairs to the children's play area that were specifically requested have already been made.

Lt. Horton reminded us that he welcomes community feedback on crime issues in the park and that the number to call for emergencies in Lincoln Park is 619-7105. If you witness illegal activity, please call.

12th Place Is Beautiful!

The 200 block of 12th Place NE has become a more beautiful place under the leadership of Wes Grooms and Marissa Irwin, with brick sidewalks, new trees, and plants galore!

Back in March, Marissa worked with the city to have trees planted on the Maury ES side of the street. We soon had four new ginkgo trees. Wes found out that we were due to have our sidewalks replaced with brick. He worked with Cody Rice, our ANC rep, to petition the city to leave all the space between the sidewalk and the curb on the Maury side open for planting. He also worked with neighbors who had concrete front yards to have the city leave them open space for plants.

With the bricks laid around the planting strip in July, the neighbors met to talk about plants. Wes worked with a landscape designer and got suggestions for low maintenance, hardy plants. Many folks on the street donated money toward the purchase price. We have also had donations of other plants, some herbs, and a tree.

In August the plants arrived, including ornamental grasses, liriope, yucca, black eyed susans, cone flowers, day lilies, and some ground cover.

Thanks to Randy and Diane Boyd, we also have slate stepping stones along the street, so that folks can get out of their cars without smashing our plants.

Next steps are working with the city to have the two ginkgos that died replaced (hopefully with shade trees!), perhaps planting more trees, and working with Maury to have the fence on the street side of the teacher's parking lot replaced with something more attractive.
