Candlelight Service 9/11 Tragedy

Members of the Capitol Hill community will commemorate the horrific events of September 11 with a candlelight gathering from 7:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. in Lincoln Park. Representatives of more than a dozen Capitol Hill congregations and organizations have taken part in creating an interfaith service that has as its themes remembrance, reflection and healing.

Since September 11 people have come together in our community to help one another cope with this tragedy and to live out our lives in the midst of uncertainty. Common concerns about family, friends, and neighbors, as well as country and world have strengthened the bonds among us. The service is seen as a way of bringing together the Capitol Hill community for a time of further reflection and healing.

In case of rain the gathering will be held at the Lincoln Park United Methodist Church, 1301 North Carolina Ave., NE.

Additional ways to commemorate September 11th include organizing community dinners before the service from 5:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. Neighbors might invite others in their community for a potluck dinner to reflect on the impact of September 11 and/or organize dinners at their places of worship and sharing how their faith has become stronger or been challenged by the attacks. A third possibility is for one congregation to invite another of a different faith to join in a pot luck dinner.

Lane Memorial CME Church (14th & C St.) will open its doors at 6:00 a.m. on September 11 for personal meditation and prayer. Services will be held at noon and 7:00 p.m.

Sculpture at Maury

Here's an update regarding the sculpture by local artist Marcia Billig, to be installed on the triangle in front of Maury ES.

Marcia has been working at the foundry for the last two weeks creating a wax model based on her initial clay version of the sculpture. These are the next steps in the fabrication, which she expects to take about six more weeks:

- The wax model is cut into sections.
- Each section is coated in layers of another substance to create a "shell."
- The coated sections are "cooked" to melt the wax.
- The wax is poured out, leaving hollow shells.
- Molten bronze is poured into each shell.
- The shells are removed from the bronze.
- The bronze sections are welded together.
- Surface imperfections are filled and the welded joints are ground down.
- Patina is applied.
- The sculpture is born!

Initiative, Sherry Schwechten, expects the dedication ceremony to take place sometime between mid-October and early November.

The Maury Summer Enrichment Academy was the "brain child" of three teachers (Ms. Ball, Ms. Walker, and Mr. Spradley) at the school. They wrote a grant application to provide funding for a program to "enhance students' higher-order thinking and reading skills." The academic component included computer technology, problem solving (puzzles, board games, logic problems), and creative writing. Other components included athletics, creative arts, and community service. Field trips related to the academic activities were included as an incentive for regular attendance and good citizenship. The monitor from the DC Children and Youth Investment Trust Corporation was favorably impressed, declaring it to be one of the very best in the city.

The summer program at Maury ended in August but there is still time to enroll your child in the after-school enrichment program that will continue throughout the school year. For more information, call 698-3838.
