Ms. Rhee and Ms. Raymond:

We have not yet received a reply to our letter dated January 4, 2007, in which we directed the District of Columbia Public School administration's attention to the lack of response to our letter dated May 15, 2005. Copies of these letters and the accompanying photographs are enclosed for your reference.

We continue to be concerned about the status of the chain link fencing around Maury Elementary School. As previously noted, the fence is not continuous on the 12<sup>th</sup> Place NE side. This allows unauthorized access to the playground. As the weather is improving there are increased complaints about the packs of young adults who are congregating at the site and threatening neighbors, from late afternoon into the evening hours.

While we continue to believe that the best solution is a complete, secure, iron fencing around all sides of the playground, we are willing to discuss alternate proposals for eliminating the unacceptable after-hours activities that take place on the playground.

Dr. Janey:

We appreciate the response to our concerns regarding the safety and security issues at Maury Elementary School. Specifically, encouraging the District of Columbia Public Schools (DCPS) Division of School Security and the Metropolitan Police Department (MPD) to work together to ameliorate these problems. Neighbors have noted that there have been fewer problems in recent months although they are uncertain whether improvement will continue as warm weather approaches.

However, concern remains about the status of the chain link fencing around Maury Elementary School. Your letter indicates that the problems with the fence have been resolved. Unfortunately, this is not the case. The fence is not continuous on the 12<sup>th</sup> Place, NE side. Also, while steps have been taken to secure the gate on the 13<sup>th</sup> Street, NE side, the cable securing this gate allows enough "play" for slender individuals to slip through. Neighbors report that they frequently witness this activity. As this is difficult to visualize, we are attaching photos and a map documenting the interruptions to the fencing on 12<sup>th</sup> Place, NE. We are including a photo of one of the many holes that has been snipped into the mesh.

We reiterate the need for complete iron fencing around all sides of the school and would appreciate continued attention to the after-hours activities that take place on the playground.



Re: Maury Elementary School Public Safety Challenge

Superintendent Janey and Commander Groomes:

At our October 13, 2005, regularly scheduled ANC 6A meeting, we voted unanimously to inform you in writing about the persistent problems at the Maury Elementary School playground. The school is located on the corner of 13th Street and Constitution Ave NE, in Police Service Area 103. Residents have seen ongoing drug activity and prostitution on the school's playground. Condoms, drug paraphernalia, and alcohol containers are found regularly on school grounds. School property has been vandalized, including the new playground equipment, which was installed just a year ago. Stolen cars have also been recovered from within playground fencing. The school staff has found it necessary to police the playground each morning, well before the students arrive, to ensure that the school grounds are safe for children. The site is particularly attractive to the criminal element due to the multiple escape routes afforded by the layout of the playground and the interruptions in the fencing. The fence is chain link and wide openings have been repeatedly been cut into it.

Principal Wilson recently called a community meeting regarding this activity at which Metropolitan Police Department First District officers were present. Videotape of vandals and photographs of graffiti and damaged property have been provided to the police. Sergeant Williams stated that the playground curfew ("closed at dusk") could not be enforced because the school is not completely fenced. He said the police could intervene if they witness a crime in progress but could not ask the loiterers to leave the premises unless the property is completely secured. Mr. Wilson has submitted a requisition for a secure iron fence, such as the one at Miner Elementary School., but it has not yet been approved.

Accordingly, our Commission requests that: (1) a secure iron fence, with gates that can be locked, be installed surrounding the Maury E.S. playground; and (2) the Metropolitan Police Department provide increased attention to the illegal activity on the site and begin to enforce the dusk curfew until such fencing has been installed.
