 - e. The applicant will use easily moveable chairs and tables that shall be moved to the interior patio;
 - f. The applicant will ensure no trash container of any sort will be stored anywhere on public space, including on the sidewalk café itself; and
 - g. The applicant will regularly maintain the adjacent tree boxes and keep all areas in front of the business and within the sidewalk café area clean, including the adjacent sidewalk and street gutter.

Advisory Neighborhood Commission (ANC) 6A Minutes Miner Elementary School December 13, 2018

Present: Commissioners Phil Toomajian (Chair), Mike Soderman, Amber Gove, Patrick Malone, Marie-Claire Brown, Sondra Phillips-Gilbert and Calvin Ward

The meeting convened at 7:00 pm.

Chairman Phil Toomajian called the roll and announced the presence of a quorum. The minutes for the ANC November 2018 meeting were accepted, and the agenda for the December 2018 meeting was accepted without changes or objection.

Community Presentations

Oni Hinton, Facility Planning and Design Coordinator for the District of Columbia Public Schools (DCPS)

Oni Hinton reported on the Eliot-Hine Modernization Project. Progress will accelerate at the site beginning in early 2019 on the C Street side, starting with grading in preparation to pour the foundation. Ms. Hinton stressed this work will not create excessive noise. When asked if contaminate testing is necessary before proceeding with grading, Ms. Hinton explained that the existing contamination tests are still applicable and as they will only be doing soil compaction, no additional tests are necessary. Additionally, to ensure pedestrian safety for school children, no work will be permitted during drop-off and pick-up times and no construction vehicles will be allowed on the Constitution Avenue side of the site. Brittney Fletcher, Office of Unified Communications

In the event of an emergency, residents are now able to text 911 in addition to calling. Ms. Fletcher emphasized that calling 911 is still the best method for reaching emergency services. Whether calling or texting, she stressed including your specific location as paramount so responders know where they are needed. Residents may also text 311 with non-emergency questions and issues as well as find 311 on Twitter as @311DCgov.

Ms. Fletcher also shared that some staff working in government buildings are now equipped with a virtual panic button accessed via an app on their phones. When activated, the app provides building layouts and location information to emergency responders as well as alerts others with the app of the pending situation.

Metropolitan Police Department (MPD) Fifth District Sergeant Alali and Officer Fisher. Sergeant Alali reported that a suspect has been arrested in connection with the homicide on the 1800 block of Benning Road NE on November 26, 2018. He also explained that officers have been, and will continue to be, posted around the clock at the Pentacle Apartments and along Benning Road NE.

Treasurer's Report

In Commissioner Stephanie Zimny's absence, Chairman Toomajian presented the Treasurer's Report for December 2018. The opening balance is \$5,825.05. Disbursements for the month were \$846.00: \$650.00 to Irene Dworakowski (Check 1855) for agenda/web master services and notetaking; and \$196.00 (Check 1856) for FedEx printing, leaving a balance of \$4,979.05 in the checking account. The balance in the savings account, including a \$.022 interest deposit, is \$13,794.21. The Treasurer's Report was approved by unanimous consent.

Committee Reports

Community Outreach Committee (COC)

The November 2018 report was accepted by unanimous consent.

Alcohol Beverage Licensing (ABL)

The November 2018 report was accepted by unanimous consent.

1. The Committee moved and Commissioner Toomajian seconded a motion to approve the Settlement Agreement with S-Square, LLC t/a Cheers DC! At 1402 H Street NE (Alcohol Beverage Regulation Administration [ABRA] #111599) and withdraw the license protest. The motion passed 7-0.

Next meeting - 7:00 pm, December 17, 2018

Transportation and Public Space (TPS)

The November 2018 report was accepted by unanimous consent.

1. The Committee moved and Commissioner Mike Soderman seconded a motion to send a letter to Homeland Security and Emergency Management Agency (HSEMA) in support of the revised route for the Rock N' Roll Marathon. Support was given in recognition that Events DC made significant changes to the race route that will greatly reduce the negative impacts on residents on Capitol Hill, including those within ANC 6A. There will be fewer street closings making it easier for residents to go about their lives on race day. And, if cars must be removed from the race route, there are far fewer residential blocks that will be affected; an important consideration given that parking is already at a premium.
The motion passed 7-0.

Diane Thomas of Events DC was present and outlined the notification process that will be used. Among other provisions, all residents in affected zip codes will receive a mailed notification with race route and street closing information.

2. The Committee moved and Commissioner Soderman seconded a motion to send a letter ANC 6A provide written comments to DDOT regarding the proposed regulations for E-scooters and E-bikes expressing these views: 1) General support for the regulations as they will improve public safety with respect to the use of these motorized vehicles. 2) Particular support for the requirement of governors on E-scooters that will restrict the speed to 10 mph until such time as E-scooter operation can be effectively eliminated from sidewalks and other pedestrian walkways. This may require their re-

classification so that they are not considered “personal mobility devices” 3) Additionally, helmets should be required when using any of these motorized vehicles, whether E-scooters or E-bikes - as is already required for motorcycles. 4) Cash payment devices should be designed in such a way that they cannot easily be vandalized.

The motion passed (4-2) [Soderman, Phillips-Gilbert, Ward, Brown in support; Gove and Malone opposed].

Next meeting - 7:00 pm, December 17, 2018

Economic Development and Zoning (EDZ)

The November 2018 report was accepted by unanimous consent.

1. Without objection, the Commissioners agreed to table a vote on the recommendation that the ANC send a letter of support to the Board of Zoning Adjustment (BZA) for a request for variance regarding the location and screening of HVAC units on the lower roof over the kitchen of the new school, and the nature of the parking lot fence for Maury Elementary School at 1250 Constitution Avenue NE as it has not yet been assigned a BZA number.
2. Without objection, the Commissioners agreed to table a vote on the recommendation that the ANC send a letter of support to the Historic Preservation Review Board (HPRB) for historic approval for redevelopment of an existing medical office building with a surface parking lot into residential use, and on the surface parking lot, to build four condo units on two separate lots at 201 Eighth (8th) Street NE. The developers are still in negotiations with the neighbors, primarily regarding the siting of the entrance, and it is hoped that agreement can be reached.
3. The Committee moved and Commissioner Soderman seconded a motion that the ANC send a letter of support to the Historic Preservation Review Board (HPRB) for historic approval for a three-story additional and renovation to a single-family home at 223 Ninth (9th) Street NE (HPA #19-064). The motion passed unanimously (7-0).

New Business

1. Commissioner Amber Gove moved and Commissioner Soderman seconded a motion to send a letter of support to the Permit Coordinator and Junior Project Manager in support of a Department of Consumer and Regulatory Affairs (DCRA) permit for after-hours construction at the Maury Elementary site to accommodate concrete pouring and troweling. This support is conditional upon:
 - Present of the extended construction hours dates that are anticipated in the months of December and January, at minimum.
 - Commitment to distribute, by December 17, 2018, flyers to residents on the 200 block of Tennessee Avenue, 200 block of Thirteenth (13th) Street and 200 block of Twelfth (12th) Place NE inviting immediate neighbors to opt-in to a construction communication email list.
 - Commitment to notify the list via email when additional unanticipated requests (not previously approved by ANC6A) for extended hours construction occur. Such notification should occur at least three (3) days prior to the event.
 - Immediate improvement to safe accommodations for pedestrians during construction hours. Commissioner Gove has witnessed and received several reports of closed sidewalks with no safe alternative provided-- which goes against the submitted and approved Traffic Control Plan, and DDOT regulations for safe accommodations.

The motion passed 7-0.

2. Commissioner Gove moved and Commissioner Sondra Phillips-Gilbert seconded a motion to send a letter to the DC Public Charter School Board expressing concern regarding changes to the notification requirements related to proposed changes and openings of public charter schools. The motion passed unanimously (7-0).

Next meeting - 7:00 pm, December 19, 2018.

Single Member District Reports

Commissioner Soderman (6A03) attended a recent DDOT meeting and reported they will be installing 2700 Kelvin maximum LED bulbs in streetlights over the next two years. These bulbs will be dimmable by block and the ANC will have input as to which are dimmed and by how much.

Commissioner Phillips-Gilbert (6A07) reported that at a recent community meeting to discuss proposals for the Department of General Services (DGS) urban farming project; one proposal, which includes a hydroponic greenhouse, received the strongest community support.

Commissioner Patrick Malone (6A05), who is retiring, thanked his colleagues saying they are “tireless unpaid public servants” and that it has been a life experience he will never forget. He introduced Ruth Ann Hudson who will fill his seat.

Commissioner Toomajian (6A02) reported that there are pedestrian safety concerns at the intersection of Eighth (8th) and G Streets NE and that he was working with DDOT to conduct a field visit there and to the 600 block of Ninth (9th) Street NE.

Commissioner Gove (6A04) noted that leaf collection has been deficient.

Commissioner Marie-Claire Brown (6A01) thanked Councilmember Charles Allen’s office for their assistance enforcing trash and recycling disposal violations by some restaurants on H Street NE.

Commissioner Calvin Ward (6A08), who is retiring, said that “it has been an awesome pleasure to serve three terms” and introduced Brian Alcorn who will fill his seat.

Community Comments

Naomi Mitchell from Councilmember Allen’s office thanked all of the Commissioners for their hard work and diligence.

The meeting adjourned at 8:55 pm.

RE: Proposed Revisions to the Advisory Neighborhood Commission Notification Policy

Dear Mr. Pearson:

At a regularly scheduled and properly noticed meeting¹ on December 13, 2018, our Commission voted 7-0 (with 5 Commissioners required for a quorum) to express our concern regarding the DC Public Charter School Board's (DC PCSB) proposed changes to its Advisory Neighborhood Commission (ANC) Notification Policy.

Our concerns hinge on two proposed changes to the existing policy: 1) that notification will be triggered only in the case of those actions that DC PCSB deems to "significantly affect the surrounding community" and 2) that notification occur thirty (30) business days before a public hearing or voting on any such action.

Instead, our Commission recommends that all DC PCSB actions requiring a public hearing or vote trigger notification to the ANC. We consider all of the Charter Amendment Request items listed in the current policy (under Item 2, Approval/Denial of Charter Amendment Requests) to be likely to "significantly affect the surrounding community" and therefore recommend that they be retained.

We also recommend that the DC PCSB consider notification of at least sixty (60) business days prior to a public hearing or vote as the minimum notification period. We believe an extended notification period is necessary to allow Commissioners to adequately review and communicate the proposed changes to our communities.

DC Public and Charter Schools operate in parallel, but not always in coordination. As authorized representatives of our communities, ANCs can help to communicate proposed changes, including the creation of new Charter Schools, Charter Amendment Requests, Renewals, Continuance and Revocations to our residents. ANC meetings are the most accessible means for communities to weigh in on DC PCSB actions: our meetings occur monthly, are publicly and properly noticed and are held in our neighborhoods. While

actions may have been deliberated for months by individual charter schools and the DC PCSB, ANC notification may well be the first indication of change to a particular neighborhood. Maintaining the current list of notification triggers and extending the time required for notification will permit our communities to have greater input, involvement and insight into the use of public funds.

Thank you giving great weight to the recommendations of ANC6A. Please be advised that Commissioner Amber Gove and I are authorized on behalf of ANC6A for the purposes of this request.

Dear Director Marcou:

At a regularly scheduled and properly noticed meeting¹ on December 13, 2018, our Commission voted 4-2 (with 5 Commissioners required for a quorum) to express our support for the proposed regulations for dockless vehicles (E-scooters and E-bikes) and to request enhancement to aid users of these modes of transit and others including the adding many more racks for parking bicycles across the District.

The thirty (30) day public comment period ended on November 26, 2018, which did not allow us sufficient time to prepare our comments, meet, and submit before deadline. Please accept these comments:

- We are in general support of the regulations, as they will improve public safety with respect to the use of these motorized vehicles.
- In particular, we support the requirement for governors on E-scooters restricting the speed to 10 mph until such time as E-scooter operation can be effectively eliminated from sidewalks and other pedestrian walkways.
- Cash payment devices should be designed in such a way that they cannot easily be vandalized.
- We encourage an increase to the minimum number of units per Ward to encourage a wide distribution of dockless vehicles.
- Finally, we strongly urge DDOT to provide a substantial increase in bicycle parking across the District to included here in ANC6A to help accommodate users of these new dockless e-scooters and e-bikes as well as traditional cyclists as these modes of transit are becoming increasingly popular and DDOT should make efforts to provide needed infrastructure to help accommodate these modes of transit.



- IV. Community Comment - none.
- V. New Business
 - A. Public Space permit for sidewalk cafe, Duffy's Irish Pub, 1016 H St. NE. DDOT PSRA Permit Tracking# 10704245, Review# 525260.
 - ii. Owner Casey Callister presented plans for a 4.5 foot sidewalk patio with three tables and seating for eight. There will be a 10 foot clearance from the edge of café to the curb. Planters will be within the patio space. Duffy's already has a Settlement Agreement (SA) with ANC 6A that addresses some aspects of operating a sidewalk café - but not the size of the café or hours of operation. That will be negotiated with the ABL committee
 - iii. ***Mr. Sloves moved that the Committee recommend that ANC 6A send letter of support to DDOT Public Space Committee for the sidewalk cafe application by Duffy's Irish Pub (1016 H Street NE), conditioned on applicants agreement to the following:***
 - a. ***The applicant only operates the sidewalk café space during those hours agreed upon in the SA;***
 - b. ***The applicant will take reasonable efforts to contain noise within the sidewalk café space including, but not limited to, using any sidewalk café removable structures it may now or in the future install (e.g., a sidewalk cafe canopy, roll down plastic windows, etc. - none are currently planned) and any other reasonable means to contain noise, but only to the extent allowable by applicable District laws and regulations;***
 - c. ***The applicant will only use the sidewalk café space for food and drink service, and not for any playing of music, amplified or otherwise, or for any other use, including live performances;***
 - d. ***If the applicant installs fencing around the sidewalk café area, it shall be consistent with DDOT specifications and the fencing enclosing other sidewalk cafes within our ANC, which shall include fencing or bars designed to keep trash contained within the sidewalk café area (preferably by minimizing any gaps at the bottom of the fencing);***
 - e. ***The applicant will use easily moveable chairs and tables that shall be moved to the interior patio;***



- i. DDOT will implement a new system for reporting problems and requesting traffic assessments in early 2019.
- ii. There will be public engagement, largely through the ANC's but also other venues.
- iii. The changes are intended to make it easier for citizens to report problem intersections. They will be able to do so without first going through their ANC's. The support of their SMD commissioners will strengthen their case but a vote of the entire ANC will not be required.
- iv. It is critical to provide a sufficient description of the problem for which redress is requested. Too often, the requests simply say "problem intersection" without explaining what the problem is (speeding, aggressive driving, light timing, lines of sight, etc.)
- v. The Ward Community Engagement Analyst (Naomi Klein for Ward 6) should be cc'd on all correspondence.
- vi. The Powerpoint presentation given at the meeting will be forwarded to the ANC for posting on the website.
- vii. The TPS indicated a desire to have a more holistic approach to pedestrian/traffic safety rather than addressing problems one intersection at a time - which can just relocate problems. A request was made to do a study of a larger area. DDOT countered that they always consider the potential effects of changes when doing their assessments. Also, while they will do small area studies of a few blocks, they do not do Ward-wide or ANC-wide studies. They did agree to accept a list of problem intersections, if provided by the TPS/ANC.
- viii. Commissioner Soderman reported that police have said they cannot enforce laws restricting trucks and other heavy vehicles without proper signage and signage is frequently missing.
- ix. Several attendees pressed the DDOT representatives to work with the developers of navigation apps but DDOT says that the companies are not interested in working with them and they have no means to compel them.

- i. The DDOT representatives responded that studies have already been done for these intersections but that they are not yet ready to share the results with the public. They agreed to attend either the January or February 2019 TPS meeting to make a presentation.

i. Committee members and members of the audience briefly discussed the merits of such a possibility and having decided they were insufficient to justify a new stadium, moved on to

discussing the best course of action for the ANC to take. Commissioner Gove also asked that those in opposition encourage others to sign the petition being circulated by Councilmember Charles Allen.

- ii. ***Mr. Sloves moved that the Committee recommend that ANC 6A send a letter to Eleanor Holmes Norton, Mayor Bowser, Councilmember Allen, Chair Phil Mendelson, and all At-large Councilmembers endorsing Councilmember Allen's position (opposition) with respect to a new NFL stadium on the RFK site. The motion was seconded by Mr. Fletcher and passed unanimously, 7-0 (including Soderman and Gove).***

At a regularly scheduled and properly noticed meeting¹ on January 10, 2019, our Commission voted x-x (with 5 Commissioners required for a quorum) to express our conditional support for the above-referenced sidewalk café application. The motion our ANC passed supporting the public space application related to a sidewalk cafe at 1016 H St. NE on the condition that the applicant agrees to and adheres to all requirements imposed by the DDOT Public Space Committee and the following requirements:

1. Only operate the sidewalk café space only during hours agreed upon in the Settlement Agreement (TBD);
2. Take reasonable efforts to contain noise within the sidewalk café space including, but not limited to, using any sidewalk café removable structures it may now or in the future install (e.g., a sidewalk cafe canopy, roll down plastic windows, etc.) and any other reasonable means to contain noise, but only to the extent allowable by applicable District laws and regulations;
3. Only use the sidewalk café space for food and drink service, and not for any playing of music, amplified or otherwise, or for any other use, including live performances;
4. If applicant installs fencing around the sidewalk café area, it shall be consistent with DDOT specifications and the fencing enclosing other sidewalk cafes within our ANC, which shall include fencing or bars designed to keep trash contained within the sidewalk café area (preferably by minimizing any gaps at the bottom of the fencing);
5. Use easily moveable chairs and tables and tables that shall be moved to the interior patio when not in use;
6. Applicant will ensure no trash container of any sort will be stored anywhere on public space, including on the sidewalk café itself; and
7. Regularly maintain the adjacent tree boxes and keep all areas in front of the business and within the sidewalk café area clean, including the adjacent sidewalk and street gutter.
8. These conditions have been negotiated with and agreed to by representatives of the ANC and the applicant.

Thank you for giving consideration to our ANC's feedback on this public space proposal for a sidewalk café seating area. We respectfully request that you include the conditions enumerated above with any approved public space application for this applicant. 


Dear Representative Norton and Mayor Bowser:

At a regularly scheduled and properly noticed meeting¹ on January 13, 2019, our Commission voted x-x (with 5 Commissioners required for a quorum) to endorse CM Charles Allen's position (opposition) with respect to a new NFL stadium on the current RFK Stadium site.

To reiterate CM Allen's position:

As a DC resident, I am against a deal that gives away a single square foot of land or a single District tax dollar to build a new stadium for billionaire NFL owner Dan Snyder.

- *I believe the 190 acres alongside the Anacostia River could be so much more than oceans of asphalt for surface parking and a 60,000-seat stadium.*
- *On average, most NFL stadiums only hold 10 to 20 events annually outside of eight NFL home games, meaning the stadium sits empty more than 300 days a year. An enormous space that sits empty doesn't spur economic growth and doesn't help the surrounding community, as study after study has demonstrated.*
- *Make no mistake - people drive to NFL games and they're going to park somewhere, regardless of how much is available. At San Francisco's new stadium, they had to rent out all of the parking lots at a nearby amusement park. Where do you think people will park around RFK if there isn't enough parking for fans?*
- *Nationwide, since 1997 we've seen the NFL pit communities against each other while collecting more than \$6.7 billion dollars from taxpayers to build stadiums for privately-owned teams. Overall, local taxpayers end up footing around half the bill for a new NFL stadium.*
- *The costs of these projects are always higher than estimated. The five most recent newly-constructed NFL stadiums have surpassed more than \$1 billion dollars each!*
- *As a DC resident, I don't want to see DC hoodwinked into paying for a billionaire's stadium. The District needs our tax dollars to create new housing at all levels, support local DC entrepreneurs*

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who run small and local business, take urgent steps forward to shift to a 100% clean energy environment, build larger and modern schools for our growing city, fund our Metro system, and in general spend money to make life better and easier for DC residents.

- *Sitting on the banks of the historic Anacostia River, a new stadium and all of the traffic and trash that would come along, would set the Anacostia River's improvement back. RFK has never had to meet standards set by the National Environmental Policy Act, and I am concerned any deal worked out under the outgoing Congress would try to extend the exemption to holding the site accountable to environmental standards.*

Dedicating millions of dollars to bring an NFL stadium to the District is a bad deal and a poor use of an incredible opportunity.
