Advisory Neighborhood Commission (ANC) 6A Minutes Zoom Meeting November 13, 2025

Present: Commissioners Dave Wethington, Jeff Giertz, Stephen Kolb, Amber Gove and Roberta Shapiro were present. Commissioner Paul Spires joined during the Treasurer's report and voted only on the first of the three Treasurer's report agenda items.

The meeting convened virtually via Zoom at 7:00 pm.

Commissioner Dave Wethington called the meeting to order and noted the presence of a quorum. Commissioner Wethington moved and Commissioner Stephen Kolb seconded the motion that the agenda be amended to move the ABC report to after the consent agenda. The motion passed 5-0. The minutes for the ANC October 2025 meeting were accepted subject to any minor or technical corrections approved by the Secretary. The agenda for the November 2025 meeting as amended was accepted by unanimous consent.

The community received meeting notice via listservs, the Hill Rag, ANC website, X, and Facebook.

Officer Reports:

- 1. The November 2025 **Treasurer's report** submitted by Commissioner Roberta Shapiro reviewed the expenditures accrued in October: \$275 for notetaking and \$88.72 for web hosting services. After these distributions totaling \$363.72, the closing uncommitted funds available at the end of October as reported by OANC were \$30,403.39. The discrepancy between NCB and OANC balances are for an uncashed reimbursement check for \$102.06 and \$516.19 August admin payment. OANC finally resolved the perpetual \$1 discrepancy between the accounts. The savings account has a balance of \$100.05. **The Treasurer's report was approved by** unanimous consent.
- 2. Commissioner Shapiro moved and Commissioner Wethington seconded the motion that ANC approve the modified FY25 Q4 report. The modification is needed due to two checks that





were submitted into the payment system but not sent, therefore throwing off future check numbers by two. This issue has been identified and resolved. The motion passed 5-0.

- 3. Commissioner Shapiro moved and Commissioner Wethington seconded the motion that ANC 6A approve changes to the previously approved FY 26 Budget as follows:
 - a. Category 3b will be increased to include a total budgeted FY 26 expenditure of \$125.00 to account for payments for website hosting and domain name registration (QFR Budget Category 3b);
 - b. \$200.00 will be added to the new Local Transportation category (Category 6). The motion passed 5-0.

New Business:

- 1. Commissioner Wethington moved and Commissioner Paul Spires seconded the motion that ANC 6A approve Lorena Gil as a member of Community Outreach (COC). Commissioner Spires is getting to know Lorena Gil and her husband as they have recently moved to the neighborhood and are looking for ways to get involved. She has attended a COC meeting. The motion passed 6-0.
- 2. Commissioner Shapiro presented results of the survey about Sherwood Recreation Center, which received 289 household responses representing 988 people. Most respondents lived within a mile of the center but about two thirds did not use the inside facilities because of lack of awareness, lack of cleanliness and maintenance, concerns about safety, and generally feeling unwelcome. The outdoor facilities such as the track and tennis court were more widely used. More than half of respondents reported receiving no communication about programming. Only 14% of respondents said programming was 'good'; equipment was rated 'good' by 23%; maintenance and cleanliness was rated 'good' by 25%. While sentiment was low, when asked if respondents would be interested in expanded programming, there was very strong interest in activities for young children such as a splash park and for adult exercise programs, school-aged sports teams, and a community garden. In the open comment section, respondents mainly mentioned the need for extended hours and programming and concern about gambling, drugs, and





loitering on the north side of the building. Commissioner Shapiro has shared these results with the new Sherwood director as well as with Councilmember Allen, DPR, and DGS.

Single Member District reports

Commissioner Spires (6A01) is addressing a trash issue on K Street; a constituent has reached out **to Councilmember Allen's office** and the Commissioner is looking to expand cleanups in the area. Several new restaurants are opening along H Street and the Commissioner encourages neighbors **to join the People's** Front of H Street WhatsApp group.

Commissioner Shapiro (6A03) encourages neighbors to join a cleanup at SWS at 9:30 am on Saturday - there will be coffee and donuts.

Commissioner Amber Gove (6A04) celebrates how amazing Halloween was and congratulates Eastern Hight School who were the halftime performance for the quarterfinals or the Washington Spirit. Eastern High will play in the semifinals this Saturday. The Commissioner is grateful to neighbors who continue trying to wrangle leaves into tree boxes and try to get leaf bags picked up.

Commissioner Wethington (6A05) recognized Commissioner Shapiro who has been working to recruit the vacancy in 6A02 - if neighbors are interested, they should reach out and get more information. A few special exceptions were approved at 259 Warren Street NE, which was a vacant property subdivided into three lots then two lots a little taller than other row houses on the street. It turns out the owner owns about a foot and a half of the already narrow alleyway and would like to decrease it by about a foot to increase space for the building. The Commissioner is trying to get DDOT and DOB to do a site visit. It seems there has been some site work and demolition done at Kingsman dog park.

Commissioner Jeff Giertz (6A06) reported some trash and recycling collection issues - DPW has cited staffing issues as a driving factor. It is particularly bad along Emerald Street and Councilmember Allen has been very engaged in this issue. DDOT completed the restriping of bike lanes along 14th Street NE including the block between E Street and Tennessee Avenue NE.

Commissioner Kolb (6A07) is pleased that his SMD is quiet and appreciates his communicative and supportive neighbors.

Community Comment

Mr. Erik Salmi from Councilmember Allen's office noted that a study is budgeted for Streetcar replacement and said that there are two upcoming Council meetings regarding extending recreation center hours. Council had a legislative meeting last week and decoupled from local taxes, making sure that local taxes do not mirror federal taxes and resulting in several hundred million dollars in savings. That money will be spent on expanding DC's match of the Earned Income Tax Credit and will go towards funding a local child tax credit beginning in 2027. The Committee on Transportation held a roundtable on the future of 'streateries' and Council is aware of the trash and recycling collection issues. Hypothermia season is coming up and DC offers transportation and additional shelters; the shelter hotline is (202) 399-7093 and they will send a van out to check on people and offer them blankets and a ride to a shelter. Finally, it is





time for the 19th annual Ward 6 Brickie Awards, which are open and free to all Ward 6 residents. This year the celebration will be at Skyline 609 and nominations are being accepted.

MOCR Noah Glasgow **provided an update from the mayor's** office, noting that Marcus Manning has transitioned to Deputy **Director of the Mayor's Office** of Community Affairs. Because of the government shutdown, the District allocated money to fund SNAP and WIC for the month of November and the federal government is expected to start paying again in December. DPW indicated that 74% of leaf collection is complete in zone A (which includes all of ANC 6A) and should be totally complete by Saturday. More information here: www.Dpw.dc.gov/leaf. The missed trash and recycling pickups are frustrating and neighbors should continue to reach out to their local representatives. Hypothermia season is November 1st through March 31st and DC provides free outreach and assistance, warming items, and transportation to shelters.

Community member Ashley raised concerns about law enforcement agent presence inside residential buildings in Ward 6 and hopes that MPD and the mayor's office will continue to be held accountable for coordination between MPD and ICE.

The meeting adjourned at 8:24 pm.

At a regularly scheduled and properly noticed meeting on November 13, 2025, Advisory Neighborhood Commission (ANC) 6A voted 6-0-0 (with 4 Commissioners required for a quorum) to support the request for Salvation Arts, LLC at 1371-1375 H Street NE, BZA case number 20967A. The applicant is seeking the extension of a Board of Zoning Adjustment Order Number 20967 for an additional year, to construct a new, attached, six-story with roof deck, 30-unit, mixed use building in the NMU-7B/H-A (formerly NC-15) zone.

ANC 6A had unanimously supported the project in 2023, noting that the design had taken measures to ensure that the addition is in the character of the neighborhood and will not disrupt the privacy, air, and light of neighbors. During ANC 6A's Economic Development and Zoning Committee meeting on October 15, 2025, the participants voted unanimously to support the extension, which is now expected to carry the order's validity to November 2026. ANC 6A encourages the applicant to move forward promptly to aid H Street's post-pandemic revitalization.

At a regularly scheduled and properly noticed meeting 1 on November 13, 2025, Advisory Neighborhood Commission 6A voted 6-0-0 (with 4 Commissioners required for a quorum) to support the request submitted by AMW Associates, LLC for development at 1332 Corbin Place3 NE, BZA case number 21386. The applicant proposes to construct a third story and a three-story with basement rear addition, to an existing, attached, two-story with basement, principal dwelling unit in the RF-1 zone. Specifically, the applicant is requesting a Special Exception for relief from the rear yard requirements of Subtitle E \S 207.1, pursuant to Subtitle E \S 5201 and Subtitle X \S 901.2; as well as a Special Exception to the lot occupancy requirements of Subtitle E \S 210.1, pursuant to Subtitle E \S 5201 and Subtitle X \S 901.2.

During the ANC 6A Economic Development and Zoning Committee meeting on October 15, 2025, Mr. Olutoye Bello, representing the applicant, presented a proposal for renovation of the property. The developer has demonstrated that the Special Exception criteria has been met through submission of architectural drawings. ANC 6A encourages continued engagement and partnership with the immediate neighbors and surrounding community. The ANC believes that this development will align with the character, scale, and pattern of houses in the neighborhood.

Re: Premature End to H Street/Benning Road NE Streetcar Service

Dear Mayor Bowser, Director Kershbaum, General Manager Clarke, and Council Member Allen,

At a regularly scheduled and properly noticed meeting¹ on November 13, 2025 our Commission voted 6-0-0 (with 4 Commissioners required for a quorum) to request that DDOT and WMATA act to ensure that service capacity is maintained along this corridor after the earlier-than-expected end of DC Streetcar service scheduled for March 31, 2026.

ANC 6A's preference would be for the DC Council and Mayor Bowser to extend Streetcar service in perpetuity. While flawed, it is an essential part of the H Street corridor that transports dozens of people at a time between Union Station and the RFK campus. Any proposed redevelopment of the RFK campus will require a way to transport people there from all the rail lines that service Union Station. The Streetcar has a high-capacity limit and with small tweaks can be used to transport people efficiently from Amtrak, MARC, VRE, and Metrorail down the H Street corridor.

The Streetcar currently carries large volumes of people from Carver-Langston and Hill East through the Benning Road and H Street NE corridors to Union Station. The D20 and D2X buses operated by WMATA also traverse this corridor. However, these buses are already very full, particularly during the morning and evening rush hours. The end of Streetcar service will significantly reduce transit capacity along the spine of this corridor and tax the already strained bus routes on this corridor. ANC 6A encourages DDOT and WMATA to work together to fill the gap left by the end of streetcar service. Running more frequent D20 bus service would help alleviate what will be a significant overcrowding issue.

Additionally, several of our neighbors who move with the assistance of mobility devices like motorized scooters and wheelchairs prefer to take the streetcar due to its level boarding platforms and abundant space for parking their devices. To assist with this issue, ANC 6A urges DDOT to install bus stop bumpouts at every bus stop along the corridor. This will help neighbors with mobility assistance devices more easily board and deboard WMATA's buses.

ANC 6A also requests that DDOT maintain the rail infrastructure, overhead electric wires, and Streetcar stations along this corridor so that service may be more easily restarted if funding is allocated in the future. ANC 6A further requests that any Streetcar infrastructure that has been included in plans to rebuild the hopscotch bridge be maintained. This would allow for a more seamless restart of Streetcar service in that event. This ANC also requests that DDOT and WMATA representatives join the ANC 6A Transportation and

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Public Space Committee to discuss filling transit capacity, the future of the infrastructure, and how these relate to the Hopscotch Bridge reconstruction.

Over the last five years, this ANC has expressed repeated support for the H Street Bus/Streetcar Priority project through five letters to DDOT and a questionnaire to help DDOT perform a Traffic Safety Assessment. In all of those letters, we have asked DDOT to help make this corridor a safer place to transit, live, work, and play. Only three years ago, 25 businesses along the corridor expressed support for the same changes that were proposed in the 90% plans released last year. Moving forward with any plans to make the corridor safer and move more people include the Streetcar or some other increase to bus/tram service capacity.

This ANC also believes that any plans for the development of the RFK stadium site will require robust and efficient transit from Union Station down the H Street/Benning Road corridor. There is no feasible way to force enough single occupant private vehicles through this thoroughfare. The solution has to be dedicated transit lanes that efficiently move dozens of people at a time in the same space that only three single occupant vehicles can use. During an appearance on the radio earlier this year, Mayor Bowser highlighted the H Street corridor as a pre-game destination for stadium events. Those patrons will need a safe way to transport down the corridor to the RFK site that does not involve bumper-to-bumper traffic through these residential neighborhoods. The solution is efficient and effective bus and/or streetcar service down H Street NE.

Re: ANC 6A Support for and Requested Improvements to DDOT's Strategic Bikeways Plan Update

Dear Director Kershbaum:

At a regularly scheduled and properly noticed meeting ¹on November 13, 2025 our Commission voted 6-0-0 (with 4 Commissioners required for a quorum) to send this letter and linked map outlining the ANC's requested improvements to safe cycling structure in and around ANC 6A. This letter and map are intended to serve as ANC 6A's collective feedback to DDOT on updates to the Strategic Bikeways Plan.

Our goals for this update include: closing gaps in cycling infrastructure, creating safer cycling infrastructure that encourages more neighbors to consider cycling as a transit option, and making the neighborhood's streets safer for all users.

Below you will find a list of ANC 6A's requested additions to the Strategic Bikeways Plan. The different areas have been placed in order of priority as determined by the ANC 6A Transportation and Public Space Committee.

- Massachusetts Avenue NE from 1st Street NE to 19th Street SE through Columbus Circle, Lincoln Park, and Stanton Park should be protected bike lanes. This will connect most of Capitol Hill with the 1st Street NE cycletrack and the MBT. This includes all four sides of both Lincoln Park and Stanton Park.
- 2. Maryland Avenue NE from Starburst Plaza through Stanton Park and merging on Constitution Ave NE and NW should have protected bike lanes. The Maryland Avenue NE lanes should be inside the parked cars. Continuing this lane across town on Constitution Avenue would provide a safe way for cyclists to travel from the East side to the West side of town.
- 3. East Capitol Street should have a center running protected cycle track (similar to Pennsylvania Ave NW) running from the RFK campus around Lincoln Park to the Capitol. The lane should also be connected to the bike path on the East Capitol bridge across the Anacostia River extending to Minnesota Ave (and if possible to the Fort Circle Park hiker/biker trail).
- 4. North Carolina Avenue NE between 14th and 16th Streets should have a protected westbound lane to mirror the eastbound lane on the south side of the street. This would close a gap in the middle of the city's best protected cycling infrastructure. On the west side of Lincoln Park, North Carolina Avenue should have curbside protected lanes in both directions extending to at least Folger Park at 3rd Street SE.

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- 5. 4th and 6th Streets NE and SE should have protected bike lanes moved to the curbside inside the car parking spaces. For 4th Street this should run from M Street NE to M Street SE, connecting to the MBT and the M Street SE cycle track. 6th Street's protected lane should be between the curb and parked cars from M Street SE running North to K Street NE (where there is already protected infrastructure).
- 6. Similar to 4th and 6th Streets, 11th and 13th Streets could be converted to south- and north-bound one way streets with protected curbside bike lanes. The southbound 11th Street lane should run from Florida Avenue NE to Lincoln Park. At that point, 11th Street should have a curbside protected cycletrack on the west side of the street running from Lincoln Park to the 11th Street bridge over the Anacostia river. This would connect to the Riverwalk trail and the path over the bridge to Anacostia Park. 13th Street's protected northbound lane should run from L Street SE to Florida Avenue NE.
- 12th Street NE should have the advisory bike lanes on the South side of Lincoln Park extended North to Florida Avenue NE.
- 8. Bladensburg Road NE should have protected bike infrastructure that connects the Florida Avenue NE, 14th Street NE, and 15th Street NE bike lanes to the R Street NE entrance to the National Arboretum. This would also include a plan to connect the 15th Street NE bike lane through Starburst Plaza to the Florida Avenue NE lanes.
- South Carolina Avenue SE should also have protected bike lanes in both directions running from Massachusetts Avenue SE to Marion Park.

In addition, the ANC 6A Transportation and Public Space Committee has compiled an interactive map diagramming these requested improvements to safe cycling infrastructure. It can be found here.

At a regularly scheduled and properly noticed meeting on December 11, 2025, Advisory Neighborhood Commission 6A voted X-X-X (with 4 Commissioners required for a quorum) to support the request submitted by Eric Konopka for development at 1378 C Street NE, BZA case number 21401. The applicant proposes to construct front and side additions, to an existing, semi-detached, two-story, principal dwelling unit in the RF-1 zone. Re: Safety Concerns along 11th Street NE/TSI 25-00614939

Dear Director Kershbaum:

At a regularly scheduled and properly noticed meeting on December XX, 2025 our Commission voted X-0-0 (with 4 Commissioners required for a quorum) to urge DDOT to renew its focus on the 11th Street NE corridor from Florida Avenue to East Capitol Street. According to DDOT's FY26 Q1 prioritization dashboard the intersection of 11th and E Streets NE is under investigation for speed and traffic issues. Given this intersection's proximity to School within School and Sherwood Rec Center, we encourage DDOT to coordinate with programs like Safe Routes to School to make this corridor safer for all users.

In February 2025, ANC 6A wrote to DDOT encouraging traffic calming action when the FY25 Q2 prioritization dashboard said part of this area is under investigation for speed issues (TSI 24-00515046 & 24-00277322/https://anc6a.org/wp-content/uploads/TPS-FEB-2025-11th-St-NE-TSI.pdf).

Concerns about this corridor have persisted for some time, including a June 2023 letter from ANC 6A (https://anc6a.org/wp-content/uploads/ANC6A-Support-for-traffic-calming-11th-Street-NE.pdf), detailing that residents have long requested vertical traffic calming and automated traffic enforcement to slow drivers. In response to this letter your agency replied (on July 7, 2023) that they planned to install 10 speed humps along the corridor. This promise was later rescinded for reasons we still do not fully understand. In the ensuing months there were several crashes, including one into a corner store at 11th and C Street NE. One resident had three cars parked on the street totaled by dangerous drivers.

In October 2024, ANC 6A sent a letter to DDOT requesting an update on plans to make this corridor safer (https://anc6a.org/wp-content/uploads/ANC-6A-support-for-traffic-calming-on-11th-Street-NE.pdf). While the inclusion of the corner of 11th and F Streets NE in DDOT's FY25 Q2 prioritization is a welcome step, we urge DDOT to reinstate the plan to install speed humps and raised crosswalks along the entire corridor which sees heavy and fast-moving traffic due to it feeding into I-695 in Southeast DC.



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

- II. Introductions & Announcements.
 - a. Commissioners Present: Chair Dave Wethington (6A05), Amber Gove (6A04), Paul Spires (6A01), Stephen Kolb (6A07),
 - b. Committee Members Present: Chair Patrick Bloomstine (6A01), Secretary Catilin Rogger (6A07), Jeff Fletcher (6A07), Mark Sussman (6A04)

III. Old Business

- a. 11th Street NE and E Street NE. Chair Bloomstine noted that TSI 25-00614939 at this intersection is part of DDOT's prioritization for Q1 2026.
 - i. Committee member Sussman noted that the intersection of Massachusetts Ave and Independence Ave SE is undergoing vision zero redesign after significant TSI submissions and that might be a good pathway to encourage DDOT work in certain corridors.
 - ii. Several other committee members agreed with that stance and that the 11th Street NE corridor still presents significant issues from Florida Ave through East Capitol. Including pairing with other programs like Safe Routes to School to make this corridor safer.
 - iii. Chair Bloomstine moved to send a letter to DDOT requesting traffic calming along this corridor and coordination with programs like safe routes to school and also referencing past ANC 6A letters concerning 11th Street NE. Commissioner Kolb seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously.
- b. Constitution Avenue/13th Street NE/Tennessee Avenue NE. This area in front of Maury Elementary was a recent installation of arts in the right of way which may be damaged by DC Water work that is also delaying the Vision Zero Hardening at this intersection.
 - i. Chair Bloomstine read the update email he received from DDOT on this matter: The Maury Color the Curb project included two intersections: C Street and Tennessee Avenue NE and 13th Street and C Street NE. The project was unfortunately put on pause after the artist completed the mural at 13th Street and C Street NE. Work had started at the other location but was put on hold on September 4, 2025 due to a conflict with a DC Water main replacement project.
 - ii. DDOT initially notified ANC 6A of the Color the Curb plans on January 7, 2025. DDOT received all relevant permits for the work, with the initial permit issued on 6/18/25. While DC Water's construction permit began April 26, 2025, their permit did not list any intersections, meaning DDOT's mural permit that was granted to occupy the right of way at the intersection of C Street and Tennessee Avenue NE was not flagged as a conflict

- within the permit review system. To date, work on the DC Water project has not reached the location mural location.
- iii. DDOT has been corresponding with DC Water, but they have indicated they do not intend to fund the cost of mural restoration as part of the in-kind repair process required by utility projects that damage city-owned assets in the right-of-way. DDOT is continuing to work with DC Water to find a resolution.
- iv. The Committee concurred that we should invite DC Water to the next meeting of the TPS committee in December (and tentatively have DC Water scheduled for the event).
- c. Atlas Court NE. This alley between 11th and 12th Streets NE and H and Eye Streets NE is **extremely wide and the site of speeding and truck traffic. A resident's alley dwelling was** damaged recently by truck traffic. <u>ANC 6A requested DDOT traffic calming here over the summer.</u>
 - i. Chair Bloomstine noted that several TSIs have been filed on this very wide alley which lacks speed bumps and stop signs to prevent speeding and cars driving over sidewalks. He has also contacted Councilmember Charles Allen's office for help getting DDOT to place sidewalks there.
 - ii. A neighbor who lives on the alley also recently stated that delivery trucks have damaged his front stoop which opens onto the alley and also damaged some planters hanging from his windows.

- a. World Day of Remembrance for Traffic Violence Victims was November 16, 2025.
- b. Commissioner Kolb asked if anything could be done to stop sideswiping and speeding on 10th Street NE. Chair Bloomstine noted that it is similar to 11th Street NE but is along a Safe Routes to Schools pathway. Committee member Sussman also suggested mentioning 10th and 11th Streets in feedback to DDOT about Strategic Bikeways at the 12/3/25 Ward 6 event.
- c. Community member Shelby asked about the uneven walk signal timing along Constitution Ave NE. Chair Bloomstine said he would ask DDOT about signal timing along that corridor and also encouraged community members to file TSIs.

Testimony for the Committee on Facilities Re: Bill 26-113 and Other Issues Related to Sherwood Recreational Center

Members of the Council's Committee on Facilities, Committee Staff and representatives of DPR, my name is Roberta Shapiro. I am a second term ANC Commissioner, representing Single Member District SMD) 6A03, the SMD in which Sherwood Recreational Center is located.

I am here to offer strong support for the "Department of Parks and Recreation Hours Expansion Amendment Act of 2025" which seeks to address a major deficit in District of Columbia Recreational Center access by requiring all DPR-managed facilities to be open at minimum from 12 pm to 5pm Sundays.

Sherwood Recreation Center is comprised of a large and very heavily used outdoor space with a children's playground, a small soccer field and perimeter track, a basketball court and a single tennis court. The two-story indoor facility includes a large open gymnasium/basketball court, a relatively compact weight/workout room, and on the second floor, a kitchen and three multi-use facilities.

Strong Policy and Community Support for Expanded Hours

During my almost three years as ANC Commissioner, after parking related concerns, issues related to Sherwood has been the most frequent topic of communication from my constituents. Anecdotal complaints referred to broken equipment and facilities, poor or non-existent programming, sanitation and safety issues. In order to derive a more objective view of these issues, I recently conducted a community survey regarding Sherwood.

- 289 households responded to the survey
- Respondent households represented 988 people, from infants to older adults
- 90% live within a mile of Sherwood; 71% with a half mile

Among the findings:

- The preponderance of households do not utilize Sherwood's various indoor facilities
- Almost 15% of respondent households cited "hours not convenient" as the reason for non-use
- While the outside facilities were much more widely utilized, especially by families with children, numerous respondents noted the lack of access to bathroom facilities on Sunday because the Rec Center was closed.
- Finally, **88 respondent household**s took the time to add open narrative comments to the survey. Again, one of the **most common topics was the lack of Sunday hours**.





Obviously, there are robust public policy and public safety arguments for providing safe and appropriate recreational spaces and activities for young people to utilize on Sundays. In addition, however, the recent local survey data demonstrates strong community support for expanded, Sunday hours as called for in the "Department of Parks and Recreation Hours Expansion Amendment Act of 2025"

Expanded Hours Are Not Enough At Sherwood

Data from the recent Community Survey, as well as issues raised by ANC 6A in previous and repeated correspondence with DPR, indicates that expanded access time is necessary but not sufficient to meet the needs to the community.

Turning first to the recent survey, lack of relevant programs, and concerns about cleanliness/maintenance, safety and feeling unwelcome were commonly cited reasons for not using Sherwood's indoor facilities.

Furthermore when asked to rate various aspects of Sherwood's operations as "Good," "So So," or "Poor."

- Programming was rated "good" by only 14% of respondents
- Equipment was rated "good" by 23%
- Maintenance and Cleanliness were rated "good" by 25%

However, when probed regarding their interest in, and probability of use of ,various programs, survey responses indicated a strong interest in new programs targeted across a wide variety of ages and interests.

For the Committee's convenience, a full copy of the Survey results will be appended to the submission of written testimony.

In addition to data from the recent survey, ANC6A has a long history of official, repeated and unanswered correspondence with DPR on these issues, including cleanliness, maintenance and programming. Quoting from May 11, 2023 correspondence with DPR, which was re-transmitted later that year, but to which the ANC never received a formal response:

- "There is a dearth of programming at Sherwood. As evidence of this point, we scraped 631 program listings (excluding camps and aquatics) off the DPR website and analyzed them by Recreation Center, type of program and target [by age] audience. ... in summary, here is what we found.
 - Currently, there are only 6 total offerings at Sherwood (4 unique program types, one being a drop-in, one open-access program).....

So, how does Sherwood compare with other Recreation Centers? The answer is not so well...

- 40 of 65 DPR sites offer more programs than Sherwood's 6; with an average of 10 per site and a maximum of 39.
- The most robustly programmed recreation center offers programs in 9 of 11 program categories, compared to Sherwood's 4
- Similarly, the most robustly programmed recreation center addresses 11 (of 17) target audiences versus 3 at Sherwood

We ask that DPR provide a detailed list of what programs will be offered, including days, times, target age group, and number of sessions, over at least the next two quarters"

Again, these letters were never answered and programming options at Sherwood diminished further in the intervening time period, thereby explaining the abysmal 14% "Good" rating for Sherwood programming in the recent community survey.

Finally, in September of this year, we learned that yet another Manager, Mr. Robert Robinson, had been assigned to Sherwood, along with several other DPR facilities. Based on several interactions with him, I was cautiously optimistic about the prospects for getting Sherwood back on track. However, on December 1, 2025, we learned that Sherwood had been assigned to yet another manager, the fifth or sixth during my tenure as Commissioner. Frankly, I have lost all **faith in the ability of DPR's** leadership and organizational structure to address the issues at Sherwood.

Therefore, in summary, we strongly support Sunday hours across DPR's facilities, but note that to be productive at Sherwood, these hours must be coupled with attention to programming, maintenance, cleanliness and safety issues.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

This Survey was conducted by ANC Commissioner Roberta Shapiro in whose SMD (6A03) Sherwood Recrecreational Center is located. This seemed like an opportune time to gather data about community perceptions of the Rec Center as there is a new and responsive Director of Programming and as there is also a \$4 million capital allocation for Sherwood in the FY'26 bedget.

In brief, survey results included:

- **289 households** responded to the survey
- Respondent households represented 988 people, from infants to older adults
- 90% live within a mile of Sherwood; 71% with a half mile
- With the exception of the workout room, the **preponderance of respondent** households **NEVER** use Sherwood's indoor facilities.
- Lack of awareness of programs was the predominant reason selected for not using Sherwood's indoor facilities, along with lack of relevant programs, and concerns about cleanliness/maintenance, safety and feeling unwelcome.
- Outdoor spaces were more commonly used than indoor spaces
- Most frequent reasons for not using outdoor spaces included crowding and access issues as well as concern about cleanliness and maintenance of outdoor spaces.
- Almost one-half of respondents indicate that they receive NO communications about DPR programs.
- There is **substantial interest in participating in a range of potential programs** for preschool and school age children, as well as for adults
- There is also significant interest in potential **music and film events** at the Rec Center, and praise for the recent music event.
- Sherwood failed to exceed 42% "good" ratings across a range of metrics.
 - o "Programming" was rated "good" by only 14% of respondents
 - "Equipment was rated "good" by 23%
 - o "Maintenance and cleanliness" was rated "good" by 25%
- Almost 50% of respondents would like to see a kiddle splash park added at Sherwood and 25% would like to see community gardens.
- Eighty-eight respondents entered open-ended narrative suggestions and comments. The most commonly issues cited were:
 - Poor cleanliness and maintenance (especially in bathrooms and weight room)
 - Loitering, gambling, alcohol and drug use and littering on the property
 - The need for more programming
 - The need for expanded hours (early morning, and Sundays, with a particular need for bathroom access on Sunday)
 - Needed weight room improvements (space, equipment, ventilation, cleanliness/maintenance)
 - Negative comments re staff
 - o **Poor communications** re: programs and events
 - Tennis court related issues.







The most common reasons for not using the indoor facilities include:


• Lack of awareness of programs (72.3%)


Use of Outdoor Facilities by Respondents and Their Household Members






How Do You Learn About DPR's Programs at Sherwood?

How do you learn about DPR programs at Sherwood? (Check all that apply) 289 responses




Interest in Preschool Programs

How likely is it that you/your family would participate in the following programs for infants/preschoolers?








Programs for School Age Kids

How likely is it that you/your family would participate in the following programs for school age kids?




Programs for Adults

Yoga, exercise, tennis, pickleball and gardening were the activities most likely to be utilized by adult members of respondent households.






How likely is it that you/your family would participate in the following programs for adults.

How likely is it that you/your family would attend the following types of programs?








Ratings of Sherwood

Additional Facilities to Be Added at Sherwood


Almost 50% of respondents would like to see a kiddle splash park (like the one at Eastern Market) added at Sherwood and 25% would like to see community gardens.

The most common issues cited were: the lack of overall cleanliness and maintenance(especially in bathrooms and weight room); loitering, gambling, alcohol and drug use and littering on the property; the need for more programming with many citing potential kids programs; the need for expanded hours (early morning, and Sundays, with a particular need for bathroom access on Sunday); needed weight room improvements (space, equipment, ventilation, cleanliness/maintenance); negative comments re staff; poor communications re: programs and events; and tennis court related issues.

- lack of programming and communication with surrounding community are extremely poor.
 Staff's failure to collect trash that accumulates on site -- on basketball court and adjacent walkways is beyond unacceptable.
- I would like the staff to notice and remove all of the people who like to hang out in the g street steps, creating trash, gambling and looking menacing
- The staff is not welcoming at all. And all summer can't use the gym because of summer programming which is very frustrating. The kids don't use the gym so hard to understand why it's not open during the day. And the gym equipment is not well maintained. I stopped using the gym after making several requests to fix equipment. I used to use it 3 days a week. Haven't been in 4-5 years.
- Would like to see increase in communication about programs. Would love to go here for free or reduced price gym equipment or dance classes





- Need more soccer space. Workout room is too small & the equipment needs to be updated. For other questions above, we participate with programs with our school friends & other community groups we are in. We participate in activities not offered.
- I would love to do something with the side yard, perhaps for outdoor parties
- More school age tennis and ability to sign up for courts
- Give the dudes on G a trash can. I don't mind them hanging out and having a good time but give em a trash can or something so my dog isn't eating their chicken wing bones
- The fake turf was not an improvement; I wish they could have kept it as natural grass.
- More pickleball, tennis, and kids dance, gymnastics and sports
- A kiddie splash park would be AMAZING! Also the bathrooms need better, more regular cleaning.
- Better hours for the gym please
- the new turf is great let's keep it that way, please
- Needs a pool!!!!
- Bathroom access on Sundays would be great for families using the playground or soccer field
- The playground should be better maintained and should use safer materials.
- Staff isn't very friendly. They don't leave the desk often and you hardly ever see them outside.
- The outdoor space is fantastic
- The indoor facilities really need to catch up to the outdoor facilities. HVAC is very antiquated (the heat is blasting in winter is actually too hot in there). We were initially opposed to an artificial turf soccer pitch but have grown to like it. We thought they would use the rubber pellets in the turn which are TERRIBLE but we found out that it's actually a somewhat organic material.
- The weight room needs a renovation and better cardio equipment. I would use it a lot if it were renovated and open before or after work hours.
- We appreciate Sherwood Rec! We've spent many hours here with our kids. While we
 won't use any Prek classes/events that doesn't mean we won't support a community
 demand for that. Thank you for the updates to the soccer fields. Also, I tend to use the
 weight room and would love to see some updates there!
- I am a privileged person living in the neighborhood. There are kids less privileged than me--maybe restless to the point of being pretty self destructive--I wonder if there's a way to engage them with facilities. Computers? Recreation? I don't know.
- I'd love to see more swings (baby and child) and shade structures added! I'd also love to see the nature walk area extended. The one safety issue I have encountered is people smoking pot on the kids' playground, which has cut my visits short. I wish there was better enforcement of the no smoking/no drugs policy.
- The yoga room is always a little dirty, and there are ceiling tiles missing.
- A community garden in this area would be fantastic. The demand can be seen because the gardens at Lovejoy Park, nearby, have a multi-year waitlist.
- The tennis court being closed for so long this year with no work being done is extremely disappointing. Work should have been rushed after the first botched job, instead it's just as slow the 2nd time. There should be a gate/entrance on 9th st. The tennis court side door to the park should re-open. It's been locked for the last few years.
- More programs for youth
- Volleyball for school age 18 and under.
- The biggest adjustment that I would like to see at Sherwood is extended hours for the building. I would love to see it open on Sundays and longer hours the rest of the week. I





think it would also be awesome if courses were offered there, like CPR training for community members. I would also love to see something like a learn to quilt workshop, those are hard to find in the District.

- For a while, hand wipes were available in the workout room to clean the equipment. More recently, those were replaced with brown paper towels (that disintegrate as soon as they get wet and are not suitable for this use) and a bottle of spray cleaner. This week, there weren't even paper towels, just the spray cleaner. The mats are in very poor condition. If I want to do any floor exercise, I should bring my own mat. I sense visitors to the Rec Center really appreciate having the facility available to them. I find the workout room too hot for comfort once I'm working out. This limits the amount of time I'm willing to spend working out, as I'm troubled by the heat. A fan or two would be nice!
- A fenced dog park would be a welcome addition to the community
- Please stay open later.
- The outdoor space is wonderful for the community, but challenging to have no restroom facilities on a Sunday. We often have to cut our visits short for this reason.
- Sherwood should definitely make better use of the grass spaces in front the of buildings.
 The playground also desperately needs more shade. Either plant trees or add more sun shades.
- Can you keep those dudes who hangout on the north side drinking and shoot craps all afternoon/evening off the property?
- I don't use the indoor facilities at Sherwood but have tried in the past and received a lot of pushback from staff. Even when facilities are not reserved, they will deny DC citizens (children involved in a non-profit org) from using their open and available space or make it incredibly difficult to do so. It's a chilling effect that's affected lots of neighbors from using the facility that our tax dollars pay for. In terms of cleanliness, the bathrooms are often out of toilet paper, paper towels, soap, etc. And the rec center is closed on Sundays which is terrible for planning events even outdoors where bathrooms would be needed.

- I am a single adult with no children— like a lot of people in our neighborhood! I'd really love to have a better exercise room. The one we have is cramped and poorly ventilated, and there isn't enough exercise equipment. It should be 2-3x its size for the number of people trying to use it. I'd also like to get involved in pickleball or tennis but I can't figure out how and the online site is useless.
- Really appreciate when Sherwood staff are outside and helping to keep people on e-bikes away from playground/track.
- Maintenance is the biggest problem in this space -- the bathrooms alone are ALWAYS a
 mess and under-resourced (not enough soap or toilet paper, broken dispensers, etc)

- Early morning weekday hours would be nice for people to exercise before work. Sunday hours would be good, too.
- There could be more seating and shade for those interested in enjoying the outdoor space but not necessarily doing a sport. Community gardens could be interesting if there is a strong and engaged group willing to maintain in addition to support from DPR however these can quickly become overgrown eye sores if no one is maintaining them. The rec center is a huge value add for the community especially families. We don't have kids (which is why I said no to the kid programming questions) but I fully support having family friendly spaces for the neighborhood they're vital to a vibrant and engaged community. I am definitely interested in programming at the Center however the DPR calendar is very cumbersome and doesn't provide much information so if there are classes happening I am not aware of them some new outreach tactics about programming might need to occur. I was actually sad to see the unprogrammed lawn turned into a soccer field. It is now pretty much only used for kids soccer and prevents free play opportunities there should be an effort to keep open use time on the schedule. If you look at the calendar it says reserved 8 am to 8 pm this is very exclusive and limits everyone's fair use of the space.

- that old building needs some TLC. The dirt on the HVAC ducts is scary. The kitchen needs remodeling. The equipment room needs at least 2 more stair climbers, the one is always busy. The weight room also needs cleaning and a better way to wipe the equipment after use, the room is often out of wipes.
- The building doesn't seem designed for access or visual connection to its site or the neighborhood. It's fenced on nearly all sides with one entrance and few windows. - Safety: I don't feel safe letting my son use the bathroom by himself, the other people that use the bathroom, rec center could be from anywhere. The bathrooms are dirty, sometimes there's no soap. Very few weights/machines in the workout space. That area is also poorly maintained. The tennis court was recently redone but now it's being redone again, why? I did notice that there's an issue with run-off from the grass going onto the tennis court. The new field is very nice, thank you. The staff at the rec center are not nice and welcoming, they're actually the opposite like why are you disturbing them?
- I used to participate in Zumba and Tiny Tots open gym time but now there are barely any classes or activities. I don't understand why other rec centers seem to have so many more activities. Trinidad Rec for example is always full of people and activities.
- We visit almost every weekend --it would be really great if the building were accessible on Sundays so children could use the bathrooms. It would also be great if there were designated times when elementary-age kids could utilize the gym--especially in the winter months. Early mornings would probably make the most sense given so many families head home mid-day for lunch/nap. Thanks for organizing this survey.
- No sand please!
- We'd really like to have access to the bathrooms when we're playing outside on Sundays!
- I could not rate Sherwood overall as I haven't been in years but you required a response so selected those from my experience years ago.
- It would be great to see updated gym equipment. The dumbbell set is incomplete (missing 55, 60, 65 to name a few). One of the two treadmills has been out of order off and on for a few weeks. Early hours on weekdays (7am?) would be awesome to get a lift in before work as well.
- I would love to see karate and gymnastics classes added to the sports offerings. Not every kid wants to play team sports.
- Can you please make this a drug free zone it's both a school and a rec center. The park
 and school are amazing and wonderful to see the changes in the outdoor spaces. As
 someone who lives nearby it is truly sad to see the indoor facilities feel so run down and
 that it feels unsafe to be indoors or close to the entrances as times
- Wonderful resource to have available.
- Weight room needs an actual squat rack
- More shaded areas around the playground seating
- A pool instead of tennis courts would be amazing.
- Playground needs to be better maintained broken equipment will not be fixed for months, and more frequent trash pick up would be great
- Please have the drugs and alcohol and loitering addressed in the rear of the building.
- The front desk staff is fantastic and super helpful!
- please finish the tennis court ASAP. it's so sad its still not done.
- Note answered so-so for above where I don't have an opinion
- Basic PR, never knew it was there! I would use it if there were a range of fitness offerings especially. I see only 1 yoga class.
- Staff are frequently late and do not open the center on time. The fitness center is frequently out of stock of cleaning wipes. The water fountains and bathrooms are seldom in a state of good repair. DGS is slow to repair broken windows.
- A splash pad would be incredible!! We (Miles and Maggie at 644 9th St NE) have a 1.5
 year old and I was thinking this summer I wish there was one closer. Thanks for doing the

Dear Interim Director,

At a regularly scheduled and properly noticed meeting¹ on May 11, 2023 our Commission voted 6-0-0 (with 4 Commissioners required for a quorum) to send a letter to your agency requesting: 1) an explanation for the lack of programming at Sherwood over the last two quarters and specific plans for programming in Q3 and Q4; 2) plans for improvement in routine maintenance of the building and ground and cleanliness in the outdoor areas surrounding the building; 3) information on alternative plans for a hypothermia shelter for Winter 2024.

Programming at Sherwood

There is a dearth of programming at Sherwood. As evidence of this point, we scraped 631 program listings (excluding camps and aquatics) off the DPR website and analyzed them by Recreation Center, type of program and target audience. The detailed data are attached. However, in summary, here is what we found.

- Currently, there are **only 6 total offerings at Sherwood** (4 unique program types, one being a drop-in open-access program).
- Currently, 3 of these 6 programs are full.
- These specific programs appear to account for 13 hours of specific programmatic use/week at Sherwood, plus 12.5 hours of "afterschool open access."
 - o There are only 2 hours of preschool programming/week, despite the explosion of children in our community.
 - o There are 7 hours of indoor pickleball, a program that appears to be run (set-up/breakdown, etc) by the participants themselves.
 - o We believe that the same DIY approach may be true of the 2 hours of weekly women's volleyball.

- There are 2 hours of yoga per week (apparently with an instructor/leader)
 - o There appears to be after-school open access to the gym; again, however, without any apparent leadership or organization.
 - o Despite a basketball court and a tennis court on site, there is currently no programming around these resources.
 - o There are no programs directed at our community's many senior citizens.
 - o Nor are there activities aimed at mentoring, leadership, tutoring or just keeping occupied our many middle-school through young adult residents.
 - o There are no music, dance or arts programs.

So, how does Sherwood compare with other Recreation Centers? The answer is not so well. Although, one could argue that programming is anemic at many other DPR sites as well. The attached Pivot Tables show the number and ranking of programs by Recreation Center by type of program and by the target audience.

- 40 of 65 DPR sites offer more programs than Sherwood's 6; with an average of 10 per site and a maximum of 39.
- The most robustly programmed recreation center offers programs in 9 of 11 program categories, compared to Sherwood's 4
- Similarly, the most robustly programmed recreation center addresses 11 (of 17) target audiences versus 3 at Sherwood

We ask that DPR provide a detailed list of what programs will be offered, including days, times, target age group, and number of sessions, over at least the next two quarters.

Improved Maintenance

The Sherwood Facility, both inside and out, is poorly maintained. This is true in terms of routine maintenance, such as ongoing rat abatement, removal of litter and garbage around the facility, and in terms of responding to urgent issues, such as shattered glass in a door.

A partial list of maintenance issues cited by constituents includes:

- A strong smell of gas or fumes in the gym when the furnace is operating
- · Weight room equipment that is old and broken
- Poorly maintained/cleaned restrooms
- · A long-promised, but still unscheduled replacement of the playground surface
- Need to repair or replace many broken pieces of playground equipment
- Basketball and tennis courts that need to be resurfaced and are often full of trash
- A dumpster area is rat-infested and has a broken fence and piles of trash surrounding each dumpster.
- A walking track that has a dangerous crater in the middle of the grassy soccer field area and a track that may need resurfacing





- Landscaping and shrubbery on the property have been decimated with inappropriate trimming by the "landscaping company" that mows the lawn.
- A historic light on the north side of the entrance walkway is broken off at the base with wire exposed and another device has exposed wire on the southeast corner of the building
- Failure to clean up trash and debris left on the property or to notify authorities of drug use or other dangerous or illegal activities on the property

Alternative Plans for a Hypothermia Shelter for Winter 2024

It appears that Sherwood is one of only one or two DPR facilities used as a hypothermia shelter. The usage of this site is suboptimal for the people who need shelter. Concerns regarding the shelter use include:

- Limitations on the use of the Recreation Center for early morning and later night programs
- Use of storage for cots etc that could otherwise be used for DPR program-related equipment
- Lack of clear accountability and responsibility for security and maintenance due to the number of agencies involved (DHS, DHS contractors, DGS, DPR, DGS and DPR contractors, etc.)

We have been told by DHS that, each year, DPR provides a list of possible sites for shelter usage. Furthermore, DHS has indicated that subject to budgetary decisions, there would be no recreation center-based shelters next winter. We are empathetic to the plight of neighbors in need of emergency shelter for any reason. We ask DPR to allocate emergency shelter in a way that is equitable and transparent.
