Proposals Are Underway For Public Art

On Thursday, May 31st about 20 neighbors and friends of North Lincoln Park gathered at Maury Elementary School for a D.C. Public Art Initiative "visioning" meeting. Representatives of the D.C. Public Art Initiative facilitated the workshop to develop a vision for the piece of art to be installed within the triangle in front of the school. Attendees were encouraged to share their feelings about the neighborhood as community and how they thought art could be used to convey these sentiments. Attention was also given to neighbors' safety and environmental concerns.

Also attending the meeting were the four local artists chosen by the selection committee (including neighborhood representatives) that the city has commissioned to develop competing proposals for the chosen site. Each of the artists is experienced at making public art and each works in his/her own distinctive artistic style. The artists, Marcia Billig, Chris Gardner, Uzikee Nelson, and Foon Sham, will use the ideas expressed by the community to develop their proposals.

The artists will present their proposals to the committee some time in August, at which time a final selection will be made. This meeting will be open to residents of the neighborhood so that they can offer their comments before the committee votes. Several organizations and individuals put on demonstrations or hands-on activities. The D.C. Metropolitan Police Department's (MPD) K-9 unit returned this year to show how the dogs are trained to obey the officers and help them fight crime. The D.C. Fire Department brought out a truck for the children to inspect, and smoke detectors were given out for free.
