You won't want to miss their performance on Sunday, October 17 at 5 p.m. This concert takes the theme of the dance through some twists, from Liszt's "Dance of Death" to the dead dancing on Bald Mountain, and concludes with Beethoven's 7th Symphony, which Wagner referred to as "the apotheosis of the dance" because of its lively rhythms. Pianist Sarah Barham, winner of the 2010 Novik Memorial Concerto Competition, will be the featured artist.
